Congregational Meeting for Information and Discussion about Becoming Open and Affirming, July 9th after Refreshments Our congregation voted unanimously on May 21st to continue to the next stage of our Open and Affirming process. Our task now is to explore what happens when a congregation becomes officially open to and affirming of people of all sexual orientations and gender identities and expressions. We will talk about this at a congregational meeting on Sunday, July 9th after refreshments, looking at what other congregations have experienced and discussing a draft of what could become our Open and Affirming Covenant and Implementation Plan. Copies of the drafts are on the back table and our website.

Sabbatical Time from July 15th to November 15th Pastor Tom Kinder will be away on sabbatical from July 15 to November 15, 2023. The church council is eager to use this sabbatical experience as a joyful opportunity—a time of renewal for the church, as well as for Tom. We propose to use the time to explore "Seeking Spirit," a framework for spiritual experience in community that incorporates both beloved traditional and new elements. 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O Beautiful for Spacious Skies Introduction and Verses

Organist Samuel A. Ward wrote the tune MATERNA in 1882 for the popular text, "O Mother Dear, Jerusalem," which was written in 16th Century England by F.B.P., very likely a woman. It later became the tune for "O Beautiful for Spacious Skies (America the Beautiful)."

Katherine Lee Bates first published "America the Beautiful" in The Congregationalist in 1895, which she first drafted on a trip west, standing on Pikes Peak. She was an English professor at Wellesley College where she lived with her beloved Katherine Coman, also a professor. Bates was a social activist interested in the struggles of women, workers, people of color, immigrants and poor people. She advocated the founding of the League of Nations and considered herself a global citizen. If she were writing today liberated as a woman, feminist and lesbian, perhaps she would write something like this:

O beautiful for spacious skies, for amber waves of grain, For purple mountain majesties above the fruited plain! America! America! God shed her grace on thee, A motherhood that bears new good from sea to shining sea.

O beautiful necessity, strong mother of new ways, Who nursed a young democracy and raised rights nations praise, America! America! God's need now calls for more: To bring to birth a peace-filled earth, with oneness at its core.

How beautiful, those truly free From self and pride and greed, Who give their life when they can see Another people's need. America! America! God grant you heart so brave You place earth's health above your self, Serve, sacrifice and save.

Mission Committee Update: Food, Safety and Climate Refugees

Recently, the Mission Committee has focused on the three areas listed above. We learned that the Sharon Food Shelf was in need of meat and sugar, so we purchased sugar, turkey, hotdogs, chicken and pork and delivered a total of 71.5 pounds of food. We also donated to both Strafford Senior Citizens lunches and Willing Hands. (in Norwich) We are proud to support all three hard-working organizations that feed many of our neighbors.

We also focused on safety, particularly around gender based violence, which feels in line with our Open and Affirming journey. We proudly made donations to both WISE (in Lebanon) and Safeline (in Chelsea). Here is a little bit about both organizations:

WISE's Mission-"WISE leads the Upper Valley to end gender-based violence through survivor-centered advocacy, prevention, education and mobilization for social change." and "It is the policy of WISE to provide educational programs and/or services to victims/survivors of gender-based violence regardless of gender identity/expression/perception, age, health status (including HIV-positive), physical, mental or emotional ability, sexual orientation/identity, socio-economic status, race, national origin, parental responsibility, language, immigration status, or religious or political affiliation."

Here is a statement from Safeline: "While Safeline's mission statement reflects that most domestic violence and sexual abuse is perpetrated against women and children, Safeline serves all victims and survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking, including males, those who identify as transgender, and those whose gender identity is fluid."

And, finally, we are pleased to donate to UNICEF, an international organization that focuses on children's welfare. We asked for our donation to be used to help and protect children who are refugees due to climate impact emergencies around the world.
