Translations and Notes

Prelude "Seele deine Spezereien" *Easter Oratorio* Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Today is Bach's 339th birthday, so it is fitting that we have two of his works in our service, plus a Postlude that is the composition of someone twenty years his senior whose work inspired Bach. Bach was a musician in both secular and sacred settings, but he inscribed all his work, "Soli deo gloria," for the glory of God alone. The final years of his career were as a church musician, and the services would include entire cantatas which conveyed much of the message and spirit of that Sunday in the church year. The Easter Oratorio was first composed as the cantata for the service on April 1, 1725, 299 years ago tomorrow. "Seele deine Spezereien" is an aria from it.

My soul, your spices Should no more be myrrh For only with the splendor of the laurel wreath Will your anxious longing be satisfied.

Postlude "Mein Hertz ist Bereit" ("My Heart Is Ready, God") Nicholas Bruhns (1665-1697)

Bruhns lived to be only 31, but he was already a major composer and organist whose work was reportedly greatly admired and studied by Johann Sebsastian Bach. Both Bruhns and Bach studied with Dieterich Buxtehude, who considered Bruhns one of his best students. Not many of Bruhns' compositions have survived.

Anthem "Allein Gott" Cantata 104 J.S. Bach (1685-1750)

This chorale was the final piece in Bach's cantata Du Hirte Israel, höre (You Shepherd of Israel, Hear). The chorale was taken from a hymn composed by Cornelius Becker based on the 23rd Psalm. Bach composed the cantata for the second Sunday after Easter. It was first performed on April 23, 1724, three hundred years ago next month. We wrote a new translation for this service that has in mind both Easter and the context facing the shepherd and sheep of earth today.

O faithful shepherd of all earth, Great Spirit of Creation, You seek to guide us all from birth, All creatures, every nation: Green pastures, all good, your intent Through loving shepherds you have sent. You call and wise sheep listen.

You lead to waters calm and clean, All souls and earth renewing. We choose the right path we have seen And know it as your doing. We love and serve earth for your sake, For you flow through all life you make, A light that shines in darkness.

Beyond all dying rises light, So we walk past all fearing. When grievous shadows fill our sight, We know dawn's joy is nearing. You are the shepherd in our heart. No evil force can ever part Love bound with you in oneness. Open and Affirming Covenant

Adopted unanimously at Annual Meeting on September 17, 2023 after a well-informed, careful process open to our entire church family.
